Leswalt is a small school, with pupils split between 2 classes. We have a committed staff team who all work together to create a warm and secure learning environment to meet the needs of all.

### Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

The school expects high standards of behaviour. This is equally important in the classroom, in the playground and out of school, on school trips. We hope that parents take an active role in ensuring that their children are well behaved and will support and endorse school policy in a positive manner in discussion with their children.

At Leswalt there are many different mechanisms in place for us to celebrate the success of pupils – both school based and wider achievement.

In the foyer we have our "proud wall". Achievements may include learning in class, hobbies, success at clubs and competition winners. These are all linked to Meta skills development.

On our "Press Wall" we display any newspaper cuttings which are shared in the wider community, reflecting achievements of pupils at school.

At our weekly assemblies we regularly celebrate success. We share learning and recent events as well as rewarding success in Accelerated reading, Rainbow spelling/tables, behaviour and attendance with certificates

At the end of term celebration and achievement ceremony in June we formally recognise achievement throughout the session, across the curriculum.

All of the above mechanisms for celebrating success are tracked and recorded in individual pupil overviews and scrapbooks "What have I done today to make me feel proud". This serves as a record of achievements throughout their time at Leswalt Primary.

### School uniform

### School specific maximum 100 words

Uniform is worn by all pupils and is positively encouraged. It helps foster a feeling of community and is a practical and cost effective.

Leswalt Uniform is a red sweatshirt, black or white polo shirt and either grey or black trousers, skirt or shorts.

For PE children should bring a change of kit including t-shirt and shorts. If we are going outside for a sport like rugby in the colder weather, we ask that children come suitably prepared with tracksuit trousers. Parents are requested to provide their children with indoor footwear for use within the school building.

We would ask that parents put names on all items of school clothing.

## Financial Support for Children and Families

### Grants and Bursaries

#### Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

#### Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

#### Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

### School Meals

The Naturally D&G local provenance for a sustainable future ensures that meals are freshly prepared with seasonal ingredients and are free from undesirable additives.

#### Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

#### Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. #### Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

## Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

## Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

## Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five

Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

In school we address a Curriculum for Excellence, more details can be found in our school guide. An information session for parents is held every September, paper copies are available on request.

**Extra-curricular activities** are on offer across all stages, throughout the year. Parents are notified of these via the weekly newsletter.

**Pupil Council /Eco group/House captains** Pupil voice groups meet every term. In the past the pupil council has assisted health and safety issues, playground development and learning and teaching. The Eco group help take forward our learning for sustainability. House captains help plan events in school and motivate their team. Minutes are recorded and distributed to parents for information.

**School Trips** We pride ourselves in providing a wide variety of experiences for pupils. Educational visits are frequently organised to give a meaningful context. We are also regularly out and about in the local community. Senior pupils are offered residential trips as part of their development.

**The Community** We like to invite the local community into the school and have formed many productive partnerships. Fundraising events are advertised locally. Every year the children perform a concert for all to come and see. Open afternoons and assemblies are held for friends and families.

Every parent who has a child at our school is a member of the Parent Forum. The parent council is a group of parents who have chosen to represent the parent forum. As a member of the Parent Forum, each parent can expect to:

- Receive information about the school and its activities

- Identify issues you want the parent council to work on with the school
- Be asked your opinion by the parent council on issues relating to the school and education it provides
- Work in partnership with staff
- Enjoy taking part in school life in whatever way possible

### How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



## Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Children who are working hard during school do not, as a rule, need large amounts of extra work at home. Usually, it is enough for their parents to share in what they have been doing in school and to encourage a positive attitude.

Throughout the school year we offer numerous opportunities for parents to come into school as well as sending out regular updates on learning in emails and blog updates.

Regular reading is promoted at home, in all ages and stages.

Our Rainbow spelling scheme aims to develop individual pupils in learning keywords in a progressive manner from p2-7. Similarly our Rainbow tables and Big Maths scheme aims to encourage pupils to learn their number facts through motivational certificates and celebrating success.

Homework challenges may be of a cross curricular nature and involve pupils being creative in their thinking. These projects offer an excellent chance for parents be part of the learning.

STAR awards are also an optional homework challenge for pupils to complete and achieve success in.

All pupils are also given a homework diary as a method of communication between home and school. Please check and sign this regularly and write in any comments you may have.

Parental support in all of the above is much appreciated and can really help pupils to progress.

## Support for All

### Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

### School Improvements

In May each year, the school publishes a "Standards and quality" report providing all with a comprehensive summary of the school's work and learners' achievements over the last year. The first part of this report provides an overview of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities, while the second part gives information about, for example, how well pupils are learning and achieving;



how well the school is supporting children/young people to develop and learn.

In June, we publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following due consultation with staff, pupils and parents. The plan indicates the expected impact of priorities on pupil learning, as well as providing brief information about the key tasks to be taken forward.

School improvements are shared at every Parent council meeting and parents, staff and pupils are invited to participate in the dialogue to enable us to work together to take the school forward.

## Health and Safety

### Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. **Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.**

### Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
